Our thanks go out to everyone who attended our open house for Fire Prevention Week. We had a great time and the Cloverland Electric demonstration certainly was the highlight of the evening. **Seasonal Influenza (Flu) Clinic  
2010/2011**

The Flu Season is upon us and it is a very good time now to get your annual flu shot/vaccine. The public Flu Clinic at the Norris Center, Big Bear and out at Bay Mills was on October 12th, 2010 (now passed). This was not advertised well and many people missed this. I apologize for not informing you but I was not even aware of the date until it was too late to get something in your local paper. There is a lot of vaccine left over and therefore I am able to provide a Flu clinic on the Island. The date is November 8th, 2010, (Monday) at the Community Center on-Sugar Island. The time will be 11:30 AM - 01:30 PM. Please bring you Medicare card or Medicaid or other insurance cards. If you have no insurance or know your insurance does not pay for the vaccine the cost will be only \$10.00. I will have both the high dose recommended for seniors over 65 years of age and the normal dose for adults. This clinic is not for children. This flu shot has both the H1N1 & the influenza that is likely to circulate this winter. One will be double protected. Getting the vaccine will protect you from catching the flu and if you do still come down with the flu, the symptoms should be mild and easier on your body. If unable to attend this clinic please contact 635-1566 for a list of clinics at the Health Department.

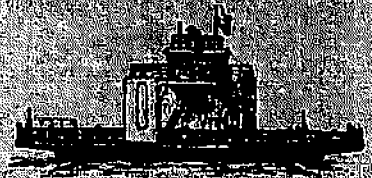
## SICK CHESS

MANY TIMES CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS GO UNSOLVED SIMPLY BECAUSE THERE IS A SMALL BIT OF INFORMATION LEFT UNDISCOVERED AND OFTEN THIS SMALL PIECE OF KNOWLEDGE CAN ASSIST THE POLICE IN SOLVING CRIMINAL COMPLAINTS.

THE MICHIGAN STATE POLICE ARE INVESTIGATING THE THEFT OF SOME METAL SNOW REMOVAL EQUIPMENT FROM THE RIVERSIDE CEMETARY. SOMETIME BETWEEN FRIDAY SEP 17, 2010 AND MONDAY SEP 20, 2010, THIEVES STOLE TWO PIECES OF METAL PLATE USED ON SNOW REMOVAL EQUIPMENT FROM THE GROUNDS OF THE RIVERSIDE CEMETARY LOCATED ON RIVERSIDE DRIVE. THESE TWO PIECES ARE LARGE IN SIZE AND PAINTED WITH YELLOW PAINT. IT IS BELIEVED THESE ITEMS WERE STOLEN FOR THEIR VALUE AS SCRAP METAL.

THE MICHIGAN STATE POLICE IS INVESTIGATING THE THEFT OF GASOLINE FROM A RESIDENCE ON 3-MILE RD. DURING AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER 2010, THIEVES HAVE STOLEN GASOLINE FROM A BOAT PARKED AT A RESIDENCE ON THE 3100 BLOCK OF 3-MILE RD. THE THEFT OF THE GAS HAS BEEN BY SIPHONING THE FUEL FROM THE ONBOARD FUEL TANK AND HAS RESULTED IN THE LOSS OF ABOUT 60 GALLONS OF GASOLINE.

THE CHIPPEWA COUNTY SHERIFFS OFFICE IS INVESTIGATING A SHOOTING OF TWO DOMESTIC DOGS FOUND DEAD NEAR EAST 8-MILE RD IN BRUCE TOWNSHIP. ON THE AFTERNOON OF MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 27<sup>TH</sup> 2010, TWO DOMESTIC DOGS WERE DISCOVERED DEAD FROM APPARENT GUNSHOT WOUNDS AND WERE FOUND IN A WOODED AREA OFF OF EAST 8-MILE RD NEAR RIVERSIDE DRIVE IN BRUCE TOWNSHIP. THE DOGS WERE LATER IDENTIFIED BY THEIR OWNER WHO HAD REPORTED BOTH DOGS MISSING TO THE CHIPPEWA COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER THAT SAME DAY.

THE CHIPPEWA COUNTY SHERIFFS OFFICE IS INVESTIGATING A BREAKING AND ENTERING TO A CABIN IN THE WHITEFISH TOWNSHIP AREA. SOMETIME BETWEEN SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 26<sup>TH</sup> 2010 AND TUESDAY SEPTEMBER 28<sup>TH</sup> 2010, THIEVES BROKE INTO A CABIN AND OUTBUILDING LOCATED ON VERN'S ROAD NEAR BETSY LAKE IN WHITEFISH TOWNSHIP. THIEVES STOLE A GENERATOR, A RIFLE, A CHAINSAW, A SATELITE RADIO AND A LARGE QUANTITY OF POWER AND HAND TOOLS WITH A TOTAL VALUE OF APPX \$3000.

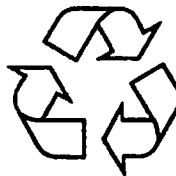

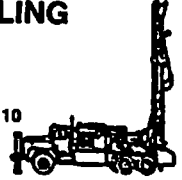

**FIND THE MOVES**—What is white's best move to gain material? (Theme: Fork)

Difficulty Level: Low

♔/♚ KING (K)—moves one square in any direction  
♙/♜ QUEEN (Q)—moves any number of squares in any direction (on rows, columns, or diagonals)  
♞/♞ ROOK (R)—moves any number of squares sideways, forward, or backward (on rows and columns, not diagonals)  
♝/♝ BISHOP (B)—moves any number of squares on diagonals  
♞/♞ KNIGHT (N)—moves in an "L" shape (2 squares one way and 1 the other) to a square of the opposite color. Knights are the only pieces that can jump over others.  
♙/♜ PAWN—moves straight forward (cannot back up) 1 or 2 squares on the first move and then only 1 at a time. A pawn can capture only on the diagonal squares immediately in front of it. Pawns can become queens when they reach the 8<sup>th</sup> row. Pieces CAPTURE ("X") by running into and displacing others. A king is in CHECK ("+") when it is attacked. CHECKMATE occurs when a player cannot save the king from capture.

**ANSWER:** White "forks" black's rook and bishop, attacking them both, by moving the e4 pawn to e5. The pawn attacks the two squares diagonally in front of it (d5 and f5) where the rook and bishop stand. Black can only save one of these pieces. Black can move the valuable rook (and take the pawn on e5) or move the bishop (and take the e5 pawn), but black cannot save both pieces. [1.e5 fxd3 2.exd8 or 1.e5 Bxc5 2.Nxc5]

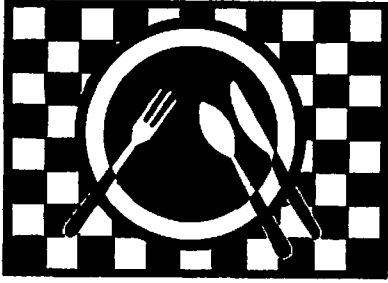
