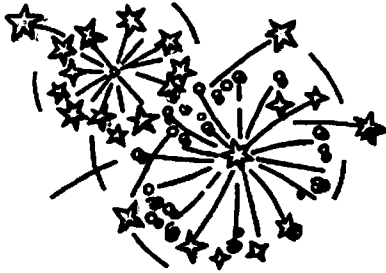

## FIRE PLUGS

It's hard to believe but July is already here and it doesn't seem like summer has even started. We were fortunate to get through the spring fire season with only a few fires that did not cause a lot of damage. These fires and our meetings give us the opportunity to see what tactics work and which don't. Also when we have another department helping us we can see what equipment they might have. One result from this was our system to fill our water fire extinguishers in the field using compressed air. We had seen this on a Soo Township truck and quickly made a similar unit for our brush truck out of parts we had available. At one of the recent fires we found a need for more and better water packs. This happened at a good time as our fire chief, Dave Pine, is in the process of completing a grant application to the State for wildland fire fighting equipment. With this grant and the money donated annually by the Franks family we should be geared up for next spring.

Another grant we hope to apply for is the Federal Assistance to Firefighters Grant. We were fortunate enough in the past to receive funding and this can be a substantial amount. We will be sending a couple of fire fighters to a training class on how to write for this grant later this month. Since many of these grants require that the township pay for a portion of the project we need to thank the citizens of Sugar Island for providing us with the funds to be able to pursue these grants.

Many years ago, when I was Fire Chief, I overheard a couple of firefighters talking while we were cleaning up after a fire. They were concerned about having enough gas to get to work as they were waiting for payday and hadn't planned on responding to the 2 fire calls we had had that day. The Fire Department then decided to provide some type of compensation to offset the costs of being a fire fighter.

A \$5 per diem was established for each meeting and \$10 for each fire run. This was recently raised to \$10 for a meeting and \$20 for a fire to reflect raising costs. Our meeting normally last 2 ½ to 3 hours and we have 2 per month. Fire runs average 7 per year. That's less than \$400 per year, per firefighter. No one is going to quit their day job to join our department. But then again I would hate to lose a potential candidate or current fire fighter due to financial hardship.

Everyone have a safe and happy 4<sup>th</sup> of July. As Father Lawless used to say at Christmas Mass, "I'm not giving a long sermon as you all know this story". So I'm not going into a long tirade about safety with fireworks for the same reason. Stay safe and see you at the parade.

In addition to being fun for adults, chess has long been considered to have beneficial impacts on learning and development for kids. Chess helps kids to develop higher order thinking skills, analyze actions, and envision or visualize possibilities and consequences. Chess helps kids to recognize complex patterns, which can help them to excel in math and science. Other benefits include enhancement of self-esteem, memory, problem-solving, concentration, imagination, creativity, independence, and self-motivation. And don't forget—chess is cheap and chess is fun. So get your children or grandchildren involved in chess at an early age.

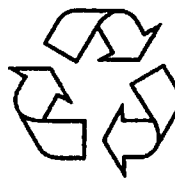

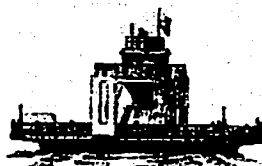

## Sugar Island Chess Klub

"SICK Chess for Sick Minds"

### FIND THE MOVES — What is white's best move? (Theme: Mating Net)

Difficulty Level: Low

♔/♚ KING (K)—moves one square in any direction

♕/♛ QUEEN (Q)—moves any number of squares in any direction (on rows, columns, or diagonals)

♖/♜ ROOK (R)—moves any number of squares sideways, forward, or backward (on rows and columns, not diagonals)

♗/♝ BISHOP (B)—moves any number of squares on diagonals

♘/♞ KNIGHT (N)—moves in an "L" shape (2 squares one way and 1 the other) to a square of the opposite color. Knights are the only pieces that can jump over others.

♙/♟ PAWN—moves straight forward (cannot back up) 1 or 2 squares on the first move and then only 1 at a time. A pawn can capture only on the diagonal squares immediately in front of it. Pawns can become queens when they reach the 8<sup>th</sup> row. Pieces CAPTURE ("X") by running into and displacing others. A king is in CHECK ("+") when it is attacked. CHECKMATE occurs when a player cannot save the king from capture.

**ANSWER:** While capturing the black queen is a good move, white's BEST move is to end the game with checkmate by moving the bishop from the d3 square to the a6 square. The criss-crossing bishops leave black's king no escape. The king has no square to move to without being captured; no piece can capture the attacking bishop; and no piece can intervene to block the check. This is a checkmate called Boden's mate. [1. Ba6 mate]

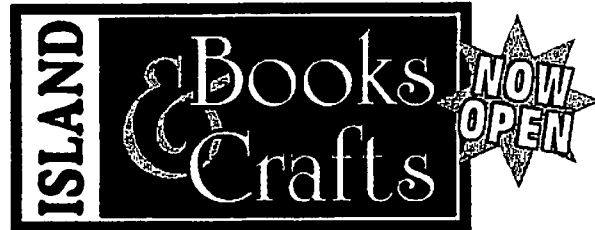

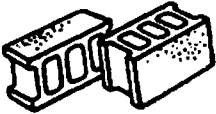

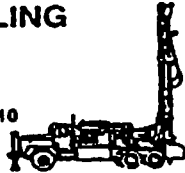
