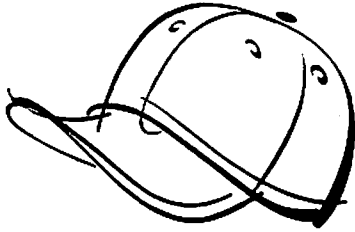

Sometimes we combine practice with practical such as washing the Community Center parking lot while trying different hose lays and water shuttles.

Our thanks to the many people who have made donations of bottled water this past month. During practice or on a real fire thirst and dehydration are real problems and water seems to be the best solution, at least while we are on duty.

As spring turns into summer we all like to take a break but it is still a good time to keep fire safety in mind. Use one of our nice days to take a few minutes and clean your chimney. 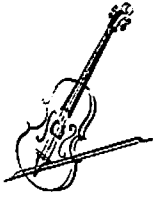
SICK CHESS

In tournament news, two of our SICK Chess players competed in Battle Creek in May at the Great Lakes Open chess tournament in the Under-1700 section. This is a section reserved for players whose chess "ratings" are lower than those of masters, experts, and other more accomplished players. Ratings are acquired by competing against other rated players. A computer program then calculates a rating based on the results (wins, losses, and draws) and the established ratings of the opponents. A rating of 1700 is decent, but leaves a lot of room for improvement. "Under 1700" is, of course, where our SICK Chess players fall within the scheme of things, but we are working at getting better.

Russ McCracken, a SICK Chess player from Newberry who often visits us here on Sugar Island, ended up winning the U1700 section. Congratulations, Russ! Russ won the tournament by beating a formerly "much better" player from Sugar Island in the final game. While I am taking the loss to Russ okay, it turns out that his chess rating improved so much from his performance at the tourney that we now have identical ratings of 1637. It just doesn't seem right to me--the computer must be broken.

Our play here on Sugar Island is much less formal and does not involve ratings of any sort. We simply try to have fun. One way we do this is to play "Silent Partners" games, where we team up players to have with fairly well-matched games, and no one knows what's coming next--not even your own partner. Join us for a casual game or a game of Silent Partners if you get a chance. And remember that we are willing to teach the game or to organize a small tourney for your family or friends. We hope to see you at the Hilltop some Thursday evening for a game or two.

Sugar Island Historical Preservation Society

Summer 2012, is shaping up to be a series of major events for the members of the Sugar Island Historical Preservation Society (SIHPS). Highlighting the summer activity will be the rededication of historic Finn Hall. With the exterior and foundation work complete the final finishing touches are being completed that involve repair and painting the ceiling and the sanding and finishing the floor of the main room. As part of this celebration, the internationally known FINN HALL BAND from Minnesota will again perform for Sugar Islanders on July 28th bringing back memories of by-gone days. This year, tickets will be sold because of limited seating, the great popularity of the band and greater booking expenses. Ticket prices will be announced shortly.

Fund raising has become a major need as more and more tasks have been undertaken with preservation of other local buildings waiting for attention. The annual Quilt raffle drawing will take place September 21st, with the first prize being a quilt designed and produced by Barb Hinton and Pat Kirn. Two additional prizes will be awarded as well.

A second raffle will be held this year with the grand prize of classic collectable 1978 Mercury Gran Marquis Station Wagon OR \$1000.00 cash. Tickets will be on sale later this summer with a limited number of chances available. Additional prizes will also be awarded.

The Annual Community Yard Sale will again be held at Finn Hall on August 11th. It has grown each year and become a much anticipated feature of summer on the island. Once again items that have been donated to SIHPS and items being sold by other individuals will provide lots of opportunities for sellers and buyers.

THE SAULT STE MARIE POLICE DEPARTMENT IS INVESTIGATING A BREAK IN TO AN APARTMENT ON EAST SPRUCE ST IN SAULT STE MARIE. SOMETIME BETWEEN 1:00AM ON FRIDAY APRIL 20TH AND 11:00AM ON SATURDAY APRIL 21ST 2012, THIEVES FORCED OPEN AND DAMAGED A LOCKED APARTMENT DOOR LOCATED INSIDE AN APARTMENT BUILDING ON THE 200 BLOCK OF E SPRUCE STREET. ITEMS TAKEN IN THIS CASE HAVE NOT BEEN CONFIRMED BUT EVIDENCE SUGGESTS THE THIEVES WERE INTERESTED IN PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION.

THE BAY MILLS POLICE DEPARTMENT IS INVESTIGATING THE DESTRUCTION AND THEFT OF STANDING TIMBER FROM THE MISSION HILL AREA. THESE TREES WERE TAKEN FROM A PROTECTED HISTORICAL AREA OF MISSION HILL KNOWN AS THE WAISHKEY CAMP LOCATED ON THE BAY MILLS INDIAN RESERVATION. THE TREES ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN TAKEN FOR FIRE WOOD.

THE SAULT STE MARIE POLICE DEPARTMENT IS INVESTIGATING MULTIPLE REPORTS OF LARCENIES FROM MOTOR VEHICLES. SOMETIME BETWEEN 1AM AND 3AM ON SUNDAY APRIL 29, 2012 THREE VEHICLES PARKED IN THE AREA OF THE 900 BLOCK OF SEYMOUR WERE ENTERED BY THIEVES. ONCE INSIDE THIEVES STOLE LOOSE CASH AND CHANGE, AN I-POD AND CORD ASSEMBLY AS WELL AS ENTERING OTHER CONTAINERS WITHIN THE VEHICLES. WITNESSES DESCRIBED HEARING MALE AND FEMALE VOICES IN THE AREA, AROUND THE TIME OF THESE INCIDENTS.

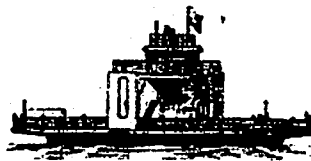

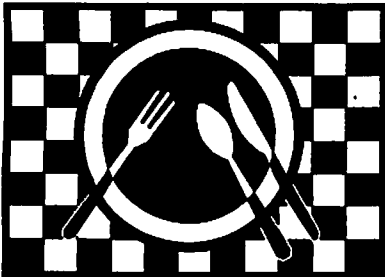

Cook's Corner Pumpkin Pie Cake

2/3 cup evaporated milk
3 eggs
1 stick butter-melted
1 tsp cinnamon
1 pumpkin pie mix (30 ounce)
1 yellow cake mix
1/4 cup sugar
Cool Whip (optional)

Take out 1/3 of yellow cake mix and set aside
Mix 1 egg rest of cake mix and melted butter. Press into a 9x13 pan.
Mix Pumpkin pie mix, 2 eggs, evaporated milk.
Pour over cake mix.
Mix remaining cake mix, sugar and cinnamon, sprinkle over top.
Bake at 350 for 45-50 minutes.
Chill before serving.
Serve with Cool Whip as a topping.

"SICK Chess for Sick Minds"

FIND THE MOVES—What is WHITE's best move? (Theme: Pawn Promotion)

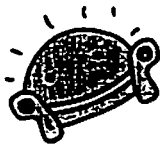
Difficulty Level: High



- ♔/♚ KING (K)—moves one square in any direction
 - ♕/♛ QUEEN (Q)—moves any number of squares in any direction (on rows, columns, or diagonals)
 - ♖/♜ ROOK (R)—moves any number of squares sideways, forward, or backward (on rows and columns, not diagonals)
 - ♗/♝ BISHOP (B)—moves any number of squares on diagonals
 - ♘/♞ KNIGHT (N)—moves in an "L" shape (2 squares one way and 1 the other) to a square of the opposite color. Knights are the only pieces that can jump over others.
 - ♙/♟ PAWN—moves straight forward (cannot back up) 1 or 2 squares on the first move and then only 1 at a time. A pawn can capture only on the diagonal squares immediately in front of it. Pawns can become queens when they reach the 8th row. Pieces CAPTURE ("X") by running into and displacing others. A king is in CHECK ("+") when it is attacked. CHECKMATE occurs when a player cannot save the king from capture.
- WHITE STARTED AT THE BOTTOM AND BLACK AT THE TOP

ANSWER: White can promote a pawn to a queen if the pawn can reach the 8th rank. To do this, white must get the black Q to move away from in front of the c-pawn. White does this with a stunning Q sacrifice, taking the d6-rook. Black must capture the white Q or be down a whole rook. White then pushes the pawn forward. Black cannot stop it without loss of queen. White will end up a rook ahead and win the game. [1.Qxd6 Qxd6 2.c7]
